DMR Notes

Since many of us are getting digital radios to experiment with we hope to have some tidbits of information in each newsletter to help demystify this exploding mode. Digital radio was never intended for Amateur use but that has not stopped Hams from adapting it to work for us. On the surface there does not appear to be a lot of difference but you will



quickly realize that just understanding the terminology and trying to relate that to analog can be a daunting task. Our hope to bring some clarity to this new mode.

The lingo of digital radio is quite unique. Code Plug. Time slot. Color Code. Digital Contact. Talk Group. Channel. Zone. RX Group. Scan List. Admit Criteria. And the list goes on.

So, for the first round we will look at the term **Code Plug**. This is an odd term and for me I first envisioned that it was a piece of hardware that you had to plug into your radio. Well, as it turns out, Code Plug can be summarized as being the configuration file that tells your radio how it will operate. Many of you are familiar with the Chirp software that we use to program our analog radios. With Chirp we create what looks like a spreadsheet file that has the info for the repeaters and simplex frequencies that we want to use. This includes things like frequency, offset, tone, a name that will display instead of the frequency number, power, etc. Well, a code plug is basically the same as that spreadsheet but instead of only having just one section to configure there are several sections that need to be configured. The main sections of a code plug are Digital Contact, RX Group List, Zone, Hot Spot, Channel and Scan List. We will dive more into these areas in future updates.

There is definitely a bit of a learning curve in programming he code plug for a digital radio but once you get familiar with the various sections that need to be configured it makes a lot more sense. There are lots of good resources on the internet and I hope to start building some links to some of these on our website.

To be honest, at first I was not too interested in this new mode as to me it seemed like it was just an RF connection to a digital repeater and then a Skype-like connection to the world. In essence this is indeed what it is but it is so much fun. When you are talking to someone in Scotland you are not making a direct RF contact but with the HF band conditions the way they are this is a great alternative and I am actually getting quite hooked on it. We have a strong support group within our club so if you have any doubts be assured that there are lots of people to help you along the way.

Tuesday Night Rag Chew



Several of our members have started a Tuesday night informal rag chew on VE3OSH. The discussion starts at around 7pm when people start to show up on the repeater. Sometimes we slide over to the VE3LBN digital repeater where we can also chat with guys like Mike VA3MCX up in Kapuskasing or Steve VA3TPS in Fenelon
