Repeater Update – 440 Fusion Died Again

Jeffrey VA3RTV replaces Dual FET RF Final. Obtains and installs a robust fan!

The skies looked ominous as VE3NAA regained yet another lease on its life. I hear thunder in the clouds now.

It was determined that the RF Final stage in VE3NAA was no longer working. The dual FET chip had given up its smoke yet again.

Using good judgement, **Jeffrey** did not want to use excessive heat to the board where the RF Final amplifier rests. Hence, a Dremmel tool was used to cut the legs off the chip, thereby making it easy to remove using little heat. A new RF final amplifier was/is installed now.



A new 12VDC fan was obtained and we tested its operation right out of the box. All OK. Took UHF Repeater cover off and set it aside. Installed fan upright so that air could flow across heat sink fins.

Monthly Update

Removed inline 10A fuse and placed ammeter in series. Before I could say Jack Robinson, **Jeffrey** split a fuse in half and we then fashioned some wire to connect an ammeter in the place of the fuse.





Checked Repeater quiescent current draw and found it to be around 300mA DC. QUIESCENT = 0.3A – Receiver just receiving and transmitter

inactive.



Checked Repeater current draw at LOW (4 to 5 Watts) power settings. LOW = 2.64A when transmitter actuated.



Checked Repeater current draw at MIDDLE (25 Watts) power settings. MEDIUM = 4.69A when transmitter actuated.



Checked Repeater current draw at **HIGH** (50 Watts) power settings. **HIGH** = 7.69, 7.70A when transmitter actuated.



Performed tests and with help from **Bob**VE3HIX from his radio shack location, concluded that VE3NAA now operating well. It was determined that VE3NAA be left at MEDIUM power.

Installed repeater back on rack and ALL operational tests were successful.

Repeater Update – Generator Issues

As well, during Field Day our generator failed to kick on when the area was hit by that three hour power outage. The crew were able to switch it manually, so all was good, but they will be doing some more analysis and testing to make sure it functions normally the next time there is a power outage.

Repeater Update – Ventilation Fan

On one of the trips to the repeater it was discovered that the ventilation fan unit, for the repeater shack itself, was having some issues. The existing fan unit was actually four fans, connected to 220v power no less, arranged in a square pattern blowing out one of the ventilation holes. Well, one fan decided that it would blow the opposite way so we had three fans blowing out and one blowing in. Joe VE3VGJ just happened to have an industrial grade fan, that runs on 110v, that he quickly made a mount for and installed in the shack. This fan, although slightly smaller in size then the previous four-fan unit, is actually pushing more air out of

the shack than the previous unit. He tested the air pressure in the shack, with both the old fan unit and the new fan unit, and there was an improvement. **Joe** also

connected a thermostat to the fan so it will not run continuously but shut down when the shack is not warm. Thank you to Larry Whitney SWL (affectionately nicknamed Tall Larry) for helping Joe with the installation process.

Field Day

Field Day has come and gone but what a fun event. First off, a big Thank You to Martha VA3SBD who once again organized Field Day. Martha has been overseeing this event for many years and has it down to a science but it is still deserves accolades when it goes off so well. Clint VA3KDK also did a lot of work, especially with the meal preps so a tip of the hat to Clint too. There were many more who came out to help setup, take down, operate stations, bring supplies, and even just drop by to observe. Funny how the observers always seemed to show up when a meal was ready. Hmmmm. All joking aside, it was great to have so many members and guests pop in.

Speaking of special guests, we had some notable ones come out for a visit. A young lady, **Charlotte Taylor**, popped in on Sunday. **Charlotte's** father, **Ed Taylor VE3FRM**, was a former member of the North Shore and some of our seasoned members remembered **Ed** fondly. She also made the mistake of showing **Jeffrey VA3RTV** and **Bob VE3HIX** some pictures of her Dad's shack. She was then stuck listening to them name each radio by name and model, sometimes with a year due to a defining feature, and whether it was a transistor or tube (or in **Jeffrey's** case, a valve) type radio. **Charlotte** is working on getting her ticket and hopes to be out at the Sermon on the Mount.

As well, **John Henry**, the mayor of Oshawa and a nominee to fill the regional chair position for Durham, came by and had a good discussion. Apparently, the city is actively looking at moving the last remaining Camp X building to the Military Museum at the Airport. This would be an excellent place for this as the museum, with the tank restoration facility, is becoming quite a tourist destination and would offer a great opportunity to showcase the work of Camp X. An offer was extended, by the club, to provide any assistance needed when they get to the point of setting up radio equipment.

Not only did we have visitors dropping by to see what we were doing but we had guest operators stop by and work the stations too. **Dennis VE3HYJ**, of the South Pickering ARC, came out several times over the weekend to help with the CW station. I am amazed with anyone that can work CW and with **Bob VE3HIX** and **Dennis** going at it the contacts kept piling up. **Ralph VE3CRK** was kept quite busy with the logging.

Field Day operations took place at Purple Woods Conservation Area and we had use of the CLOCA building giving us gorgeous views overlooking southern Durham Region and Lake Ontario. Overall, I think everyone had a great time. We had two stations setup inside the building and two in tents on the periphery. Even though we were supposed to be 4A, meaning four stations running on generator, one station failed and did not make any contacts. In preliminary discussions for next year have kicked around the idea of having all four stations inside the building. It is quite a large facility so each station really would not disturb each other even though all stations would be in the same room. With sliding doors that open on each side the stations could also easily move out under the overhangs if the weather was nice. There is ample room to set up four HF antennas without much fear of interference and we could even put all the generators in one section and possibly consolidate a couple of them. Since this location would potentially be a communication centre in the time of a real emergency we might as well use Field Day to work on how we would configure it for such an event.

The highlight of the weekend was when the power, everywhere north of Taunton Rd in Oshawa, was cut for about three hours, including our Purple Woods site, and was cast into complete darkness. After some immediate concerns calmness returned when it was realized that this is what Field Day truly is about. We still had

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a sheltered facility to work out of. We were still using our own generators to run all the stations. Our repeater shack and network centre had backup power once the generator kicked in. The fireflies in the meadow and forest were putting on a great light show. About the only thing that we did not have was lights in the parking lot, running water and flush toilets. In a prolonged power outage we could manage the latter two issues by simply bringing in a supply of water. Martha VA3SBD our quartermaster, had plenty of food and drinking water on hand so we

The one glitch in the whole power failure incident was that our backup generator for the repeater did not kick on automatically the way it is designed to. It has worked in previous failures but decided not to play nicely during this one. Fortunately, Bob VE3HIX, Jeffrey VA3RTV and Clint VA3KDK were at the site so they could get a good firsthand look at the situation instead of having to work on hearsay.

Thanks, again, to all those that help make Field Day 2018 a resounding success.
