2 case of 12 - diet pop



Joe VE3VGJ was heading north and right around Appsley he was hitting direct an APRS igate station, VE3PHC, in Sudbury.



Repeater Update – Generator Issues

The repeater team discovered a few issues with the generator when we were doing some testing recently. The generator responds as it should when there is a power failure in that 15 seconds into a power failure the transfer switch will trip, the generator will start, and we will have power within about 45 seconds. What they did discover, though, was that the generator ran quite rough for the first minute or two and even when it warmed up it was not running as well as one would think and there was the distinct odor of propane signalling that the engine was probably running rich and not burning fuel properly. Bob VE3HIX went to work looking up info on the internet and quickly diagnosed that the valve clearance was not correct and was able to make those changes on a subsequent visit. The generator now starts up a lot easier and is running quite smoothly when operating. Another interesting find was that a branch of the tree, behind the generator building, had grown so much that it was preventing the buildings ventilation louvers from opening. A quick cut with a saw corrected that problem. Finally, after spending quite some time with his head in the generator case, working on the valve clearance issue, and becoming intimately familiar with how it was setup, Bob was spending some leisurely hours at home reading through the generator manual. He came across a diagram that made him question if the propane was connected to the wrong port on the generator. Our generator can be run on either propane or natural gas. After looking at diagrams he was suspicious that our current configuration may be hooked up incorrectly.



Well, all that meant is that we now had another excuse to meet at White Feather Farms for breakfast followed by another short trip up the hill to the repeater site.

Here are **Bob's** words as to what was discovered.

"As we saw today, the gas regulator is actually connected properly on the Liquid Propane side, not the Natural Gas side. The actual regulator is installed backward, compared to the one in the book, to allow easy access to the Natural Gas adjustment (unused in our application). The attached illustration and photo show that the position is different, but the connection is correct. The generator now starts and runs smoothly, with no exhaust odor."

Excellent troubleshooting **Bob!** It just goes to show that even when you think you are wrong you are right!
