

This is a follow up on the article APRS Ping of the Month in the September Update. For the fun of it here is more information. The APRS radio was set to transmit at 20 watts. The distance was 289 km.



The elevation (ground) of VE3PHC-10 is 351meters and VE3VGJ-9 is 350 only a meter difference, not including antenna towers, with elevated areas of almost 100 meters between.
