Since we are Amateurs, and part of being an Amateur is to be ready to provide communication in emergency situations, this evening's presentation will be a show-and-tell format where you can bring in your emergency kits and explain to the members what you have in your kit and why you chose those items. Your kit may be as simple as a 2m handheld and a roll-up J-Pole or extensive as a self-contained

unit with a radio, power supply, solar cells and battery along with other needed provisions. The intent is not to show off how extravagant your kit is but to give others ideas as to what they can include in their kits that they may not have thought of. When I was Googling emergency radio kit it was interesting to see that a lot of people who participate in prepper activities also encourage their followers to become Amateurs as they realize the value of not only communicating but knowing the theory behind it when it comes to an emergency situation.

Distracted Driving Presentation

As of January 1, 2019 you can receive a fine of \$1,000 and lose 3 points for the first offence. Amateurs have been given an exception until 2021 and there is a section in the regulations just about

Field Day Co-ordinator Needed



We are in need of someone to fill the position of Field Day Co-ordinator this June 22-23. Martha VA3SBD has worked hard in the past and turned this into a well-organized event but, unfortunately, is not able to lead out this year. The co-ordinators role will entail the following:

- Food organizing, but not necessarily cooking, lunch and supper on the Saturday, breakfast on the Sunday and having snacks and beverages available
- ARRL Liaison making sure all documentation is submitted to the ARRL for scoring
- Stations solicit members to setup and run up to four stations

With regards to the food it does not need to be extravagant. Sandwiches, burgers, dogs, coffee, water, chips, cookies, etc are fine. If people want more than they are welcome to bring what they like. Operators or other members on-site are capable of sharing the culinary duties.

The teams of operators look after the installation and take-down of their equipment with the help of volunteers who come to help out during those times. Last year we had two stations inside the CLOCA building (see pic above) and two outside in tents. I think this year we should put all four inside as it is a large enough area that I don't think we will interfere with each other and each corner has a door to the outside.



If you are needing to check out the elevation between two locations, and any potential natural obstructions, then you may want to take a peek at this free online option.


Scadacore

Even though we have had some cold Arctic temperatures coupled with less than ideal precipitation we have made several treks to the repeater site to service some equipment. There was a power failure a few weeks ago that lasted up to 30 minutes. In that time our UPS batteries, that run several controllers and the DMR radios, died as they are only designed to run for 10 minutes or so. Normally this would not happen as the backup generator would kick on in less than two minutes but, as luck would have it, the starter motor on the propane generator fried so it never turned on. A new starter motor was ordered, has arrived and is awaiting installation. On a positive note, the heater that was installed in the repeater shack works perfectly and makes it enjoyable to work up there even when it is really cold.
