
Don't forget the next meeting - OSHAWA AIRPORT - 6:30 P.M. There will be No meeting at Thorntons Community centre, so don't show up there.

FIELD DAY SITE

This year's field day will be held at the same place as last year - Bill Cox's farm in Bownanville. To get there take highway #2 to bownanville,& turn North at Liberty Street, keep on liberty street untill you reach Concession st., turn right. Stay on Concession st. as fer as the first County road past the boys training school, and from here turn north past the railway crossing and a concession road. Go on a little further and you will be there.



Field Day is superlatives. It is the only activity where we have no yardstick for measuring except " the most ", so that the descriptions that sound like exeration to the layman are commonplace to us. It is in Dickens wording " the best of times and the worst of times".

There is no weather any time of the year that compares with that last weekend in June, and the Weather Bureau's official bulletins are only the merest hint of what we can expect. OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 271 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN. MAY' 2 1970 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

The ARRL board of directors in annual meeting May 1-2 directed the filing of strong opposition to restrictive proposals on VHF repeators. Lesgue will request rules permitting maximum privalages such as chain linking, code access optional rather than manditory, crossband operation permitted, elimination of restrictive subbands. The board discussed all aspects of radiotelephony subbands on lower frequencies and decided that in best interests of U.S. amateursto propose expantion at this time. The board established a permanent structure of advisory committees, continued the present two on contests and VHF repeators, and announced a new one on DX matters. The VHF committee in particular was comended for cutstanding work on FCC rules proposals. Family and blind membership dues were raised to two dollars to more nearly represent true costs. W3GKP and W4hhk jointly received the ARRL technical merit award for cutstanding achievements in mocnbounce communication. A nation convention was approved for labour day weekend 1972 in long beach california. Studies in depth were crdered on several additional matters, such as reduced teen-age membership fees, WIAW daytime code practice and bulletins, a league station on the west coast, payment for erticles in QST, retired staff empoyee pensions, a series of articles on construction of hand held emergency gear, and interference to solid state home entertainment devices. A list of manufacturers suppling free high pass tv filters will be assembled and published. Subjects discussed but rejected were a move of WlAW frequencies, a propogation column in QST, Manditory meetings of the board twice yearly, and a promotional book aimed at teen-agers which the board felt needed more study. Directors ordered the spensorship of a 160 meter contest, and change to 175 miles the current 100 mile limit for affiliated club aggregate contest scores. Charles G. Compton WØBUO was newly elected as first vice president and incumbent W.M. Groves W5NW, was given a standing ovation for his 35 years dedicated service to ARRL and made an honorary vp. Robert Thuston W7PGY, was elected to the vacancy on the executive committee. Carl L. Smith WØBWJ, is a new additional vice president and GIlbert L. Crossly W3YA a new honorary vp. All other officers and executive members were reelected. Highlights of the meeting will appear in June QST, and full minutes in the July issue.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR265 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN. MARCH 19 1970 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

Headquarters is conducting a survey of the effectiveness of the Official Bulletin Station program. It will be appreciated if you will the identity of the station from which you first copied the following bulletin and the frequency on which copied.

The amateur radio satellite oscar V has reached the end of life. All amateurs who received the satellite's signals are urged to send a report to AMSAT, box 27, Washington, D.C. 2004. Each report will be acknowledged with an attractive QSL. Of special interests are reports of the 2 meter signal after Feb. 13, and reports of the 10 meter signal after March 8, to determine who was last to hear the signals. Satellite observations during the march 9 solar eclipse and auroral are also sought. AR

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 266 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CONN. MARCH 26 1970 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

A bulletin transmitted in february advised that western union facsimile equipment would soon be available through selected affiliated clubs. Late advice from WOPYW who is handling this for ARRL indicates WU is recreanizing surplus disposal channels causing a minor delay. However, both fax and teleprinter gear will again be released in the near future. Meanwhile W3PYW is firming up apprpriate with selected clubs to assure equitable distribution. Please do not write or call ARRL or W3PYW. When arrangements have been completed another bulletin will be issued with further details. It is hoped that an article on conversion of the available desk fax units can be run in the early issue of QST. AR

A UK1,3,4,9,0, followed by any letter, a UK2F, a UK6A,E,H,I,J,L,P,U,W,X,Y,INDICATES Russian SFSR. A UK2A, c,i,l,o,s,w;White Russia. UK2B or UK2P; Lithuania. UK2Q or UK2G;Latvia. UK2R, UK2t; Estonia.UK5O; Moldavia. UK5 followed by any letter except o:Ukraine. UK6F,O,V,; Geogia. UK6G; Armenia. UK6D, C,K; Azerbaijan. UK7 followed by any letter; Kazakh. UK8H; Turkoman. UK8J or UK8R; Tadzhik. UK8M or UK8N; Kirghiz. UK8A, J,D,F,G,I,L,O,T,U,Z; Uzbek. All VHF stations in the U.S.S.R. have the prefix UR.
