



FROM THE SEPTEMBER MEETING

RAY (OUB) AND KEITH (DZM), WHO HAD BEEN ASKED TO INVESTIGATE THE POSSIBILITY OF A NEW MEETING PLACE, REPORTED THAT THE MOST PROMISING PLACE THEY HAD SEEN WAS NOT AVAILABLE FOR TUESDAY NIGHTS, AND, SINCE THEY WERE NOT AUTHORIZED TO SPEAK FOR ANY OTHER NIGHT, DID NOT ASK FOR ANOTHER NIGHT ALTHOUGH ANOTHER NIGHT WAS AVAILABLE AT THAT TIME. THE APPARENT ADVANTAGES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. QUIETER, SMALLER AREA WITH NO COMPRESSORS OR ECHOES.
- 2. NO COMPETING WITH NIGHT SCHOOL FOR PARKING
- 3. AIR CONDITIONING
- 4. LICENSED BY LCBO THEREBY ELIMINATING NEED FOR OTHER ARRANGEMENTS FOR WINE AND CHEESE PARTY AND SAVING A MINIMUM OF \$75 WHILE GIVING US MORE SPACE.

RIDE FOR THE HANDICAPPED - RAY (OUB)

THIS EQUESTRIAN EVENT IS HELD ANNUALLY TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE HANDICAPPED. VARIOUS RIDERS OBTAIN SPONSORS FOR THE CROSS-COUNTRY RIDE WHICH BEGINS AND ENDS AT THE HOSKINS STABLES WHICH IS THE MAIN HOST FOR THE EVENT. THIS YEAR THERE WERE 44 RIDERS (MOSTLY WOMEN) YOUNG AND OLD AND A SIZEABLE AMOUNT WAS RAISED. MEMBERS OF OUR CLUB USUALLY PROVIDE COMMUNICATIONS AND THIS YEAR WAS NO EXCEPTION AS RALPH (CRK), HUGH (EVJ), BOB (LLZ), WALTER (DYE), AND MYSELF (OUB) WERE ON HAND TO HELP MAKE THINGS RUN SMOOTHLY (AS THEY DID).

PROFILE OF A ROTTEN HAM BY KEITH (GDF)

NOW, AS ANYONE KNOWS, THE NAVIGATOR SOMETIMES GETS LOST, AND, IN ORDER THAT HE MIGHT BE ABLE TO LET SOMEONE KNOW WHERE THE AIRCRAFT HAD CRASHED (IN THE EVENT THAT THE RADIO OPERATOR WAS OVERCOME BY THE IMPACT), HE WAS TAUGHT A FEW OF THE CHARACTERS OF THE THEN-IN-VOGUE DI-DAH LANGUAGE.

YOU MAY THINK THAT THIS WAS THE BEGINNING OF A GREAT INTEREST IN RADIO BUT NOTHING WAS FURTHER FROM THE TRUTH. KEITH (DZM) AND A COUPLE OF OTHER MEMBERS OF THAT CLASS OBTAINED THEIR LICENSES BUT THE FUTURE GDF LEFT FOR BROWNER PASTURES WITHOUT HIS.

AFTER ALMOST A DECADE IN TORONTO AND NO FURTHER CONTACT WITH HAM RADIO (IN SPITE OF THE FACT THAT HE HAD A DISTANT COUSIN ELWOOD (AJA), WHOM HE ADMIRED BUT WAS NEVER CLOSE TO, LIVING IN TORONTO), HE RETURNED TO HIS FORMER EMPLOYER IN OSHAWA TO FIND THAT, IN THE INTERVENING YEARS, HIS FRIEND COLIN HAD BECOME VE3 CEU. WELL, NOW!, LABOURING UNDER THE IMPRESSION THAT, ANYTHING COLIN COULD DO, HE COULD DO, HE, AGAIN, TOOK TO THE BOOKS AND THIS TIME EVEN WROTE AND AQUIRED HIS TICKET (CIRCA 1965).

General Radio Regulations, Part II, amendment

Description

The Minister of Communications is authorized by the Radio Act to make certain regulations that are needed for effective management of the radio frequency spectrum. The radio frequency spectrum is a natural resource that must be shared by all of the users of radio throughout the whole world, and this is managed by setting aside frequencies and blocks of frequencies for particular purposes by specified classes of users as agreed upon by the representatives of all governments meeting from time to time as members of the International Telecommunication Union (ITU).

This amendment will implement a decision of the 1979 World Administrative Radio Conference of the International Telecommunication Union to make available two additional bands of frequencies for use by the Amateur service. That decision involving a re-allocation of frequency bands made necessary by changing needs of radio users was supported by the Canadian delegation to the Conference. As of November 1, 1985 all of the fixed stations that were formerly using frequencies in the 18 and 24 MHz bands have been relocated to other frequencies. (Fixed stations are stations authorized to exchange radiocommunications between one fixed location and another). Consequently there is now no impediment to implementation of the ITU decision and most if not all other countries have already done so in respect of their own Amateur services. As amateurs on a world-wide basis are very numerous, access to additional bands of frequencies will relieve somewhat the crowded conditions they experience.

Alternatives Considered

The alternative is to do nothing, which would be to deny the Canadian Amateur service access to and use of two bands of frequencies that have been made available by International agreement. Changing requirements that are not necessarily limited to advances in information-transfer technologies dictate the re-allocation of frequencies or blocks of frequencies from time to time. It is also a fact that not all frequencies are satisfactory for any or all purposes. The amateur population of users are best able at this point in time to make use of these bands of frequencies and Canadian amateurs would not be able to share in the benefits if access to these bands were denied to them. As a member of the ITU taking an active part in the development of International frequency allocation policies, Canada has an obligation to implement the decisions of that body.

Consistency with Regulatory Policy and Citizens' Code

This amendment will implement a better distribution of radio frequencies that is made possible by the changing requirements of radio users. In principle, this action responds to the requirement that we minimize interference with

individual freedoms while maintaining protection for the community interests of radio users as a whole.

Anticipated Impact

The radio frequency bands affected by this amendment have been vacated by Canadian users in the fixed radiocommunication services. Their needs have been better satisfied elsewhere and satellite radiocommunications taking place in an entirely different portion of the spectrum are eliminating the need for many stations in this category. On the other hand, there are over 25,000 licensed radio amateurs in Canada and many of them have been waiting for authority to use these bands which are already being used by their counterparts in most if not all other parts of the world. As former Canadian users of these bands have already been permanently relocated elsewhere, there can be no objection to this action and there is now no reason for further delay.

Consultation

Canadian amateurs and other users of radio are represented in the international fora under auspices of the International Telecommunication Union which arrived at this decision in line with its responsibilities for the allocation of radio frequency bands at the international level. As the users of these frequencies concurred and were active in the decision making process there is no need for further consultation. Additionally, the frequencies involved are not particularly attractive to, nor are they needed by Canadian commercial users of radio now that other better alternatives have become available to them.

Compliance Mechanism

This amendment has no effect on and makes no change whatever in existing provisions or mechanisms designed to ensure compliance.
