DXing

Like many hams - I enjoy dx'ing. I have only been a ham for five years. My DXCC confirmed list is small. As I write this article, I acknowledge the veterans whose walls are lined with exotic cards. And whose memories are rich with great radio experiences.

I have heard radio veterans now from both sides. I have armed wrestled with them in pile ups, and I have given them their 5 by 9's from the other end of the pile up. Who are the dx giants? Who are the winners and the losers in the mighty awards chase? When we think of winners we think of men who sit in leather swivel chairs. Their expensive equipment is arranged on cherry wood shelves. Their hands rest at the base of swan necked, chrome desk mikes. They smile at us as they look out from the cover of radio magazines. Their international awards are arranged in the

background. When we think of winners we think of heavy weight linears, antenna farms, and hundred foot towers.

What hurts so much is that great portions of this picture are correct. I have sat in the background like a hungry puppy, while ten gallon cowboys have dined with hams in Australia. When dinner ended, I jumped for table scraps only to hear, "Sorry old man, I've got a weak copy on you here, down under."

Who are dx'ers? It is easy to forget the legion of hams, whose hobby is defined by difficult operating situations. Hams who live in urban conglomerates, and who desperately struggle to avoid the "Worked All Neighbours," award. Many of these are our QRP operators. We forget the elderly who can no longer climb towers, and who struggle to tune dipoles which have been stretched beyond hope by the weight of ice storms. We forget the blind who depend on the help of the sighted and who are unable to take the control they would like over their antenna systems. We forget those who live in pristine communities with 5 cm lawns, and sculptured hedges - and neighbours who rebel at the site of antennas. We forget the apartment dwellers who struggle to work the world with verticals strapped to chimneys, above the 14th floor - or worst still, with inverted v's strung along balconys. We forget those whose gasping Heathkits with leaking tubes are dictated by pocket books which decide that bread and boots come first.

Having worked pileups, and read the comments on QSL cards which I received - I suspect that the majority of hams I worked, run barefoot. These are average amateurs. Men and women who pack lunch bags and drive off to work in the morning, struggle with bankbooks, raise kids, and play a little radio in the evenings or on the weekends - when the time allows. These are also our senior men and women who have been hams for 30 years plus, and who every once in a while remember to turn on the rigs. They have long since stopped sending out QSL cards (what do they do when they receive

them?) and they fire up their sets wondering if they can break the pile up. For these hams, the dx pile up is another form of British Bulldog. Breaking the pile up is the name of the game! Blasting the pins from the end of the alley, on the first roll.

I suspect that most of the hams I have worked on the receiving end of pile ups have operated average middle of the road - barefoot radios. Most of the hams I hear seem say that their antenna's peak at 35'. Their eyes grow moist when they drive along country roads and see tidy homes sitting on an acre of land. They dream of antenna farms.

I suspect that to a degree, much of our success rests in the lap of the gods. He who is blessed with the best path of propagation runs nose to nose against the athletes who rise from their stools, shake off their silk robes, and pull the ropes. They know they are the champions of their class. They enter the fight with superior power, compression mikes, stacked arrays, and hundred foot towers.

I found that when I faced a wave of voices on the other end of the pile up the Voice of Texas demanded to be heard. The temptation was to answer him and clear him off the slate to get down to business. The problem was he was usually replaced by another Texas kilowatt. When the playing field is level - patience and good timing is critical. The first or the last to transmit catches attention.

It is possible that the pile up host hears you! He has a large number of call signs to acknowledge, and can only work one station at a time. Unfortunately, it is not possible to assign numbers at the dx check out counter.

The Alpha Charlie, Alpha Charlie, Alpha Charlie station is an annoyance. I found myself deliberately avoiding Alpha Charlie. He could sit on the back burner for a few minutes.

Like voices of control on pile ups, my operating practices were defined by the

many times I had thrown myself into the wave. I have know the frustration of trying to stick handle through a pile up - only to hear a heavy weight break the barrier with his first call.

While we each have personal biases, I find my teeth grinding in frustration when everything stops while someone tunes up. These hams lack a mature understanding of the nature of amateur radio. They are the "I take care of myself Jack, you can take care of yourself" types. The concept of the brotherhood of radio goes over their heads.

QSL managers for dxpeditions look in bewilderment when they see cards coming in without a SASE - or an IRC. As they work their way down the list - these cards are flipped into the "by the bureau box" They go when they go.

The all time radio klutz award was sent to the ham who mailed us his qsl card - with 2 dimes taped in lieu of a stamp to the envelope. The post office had stamped it with a postage due demand. It takes a world of people to make a world. It takes a bushel of apples to make a bushel of apples. And so it is in amateur radio.

In the final analysis - common sense, patience, and courtesy are the hallmarks which distinguish a professional amateur.

Firebird A.R.C.

Having just returned from the Fall convention of the Firebird Amateur Radio Club in Bowling Green, Kentucky, I would like to use a few lines of "SPARKS" to fulfill a promise I made to the approximately 100 people in attendance. That was to inform as many people in our own area about the activities and benefits of club membership. I must waste no time in pointing out that membership to the Firebird A.R.C. is restricted to active or retired employees of General Motors Corporation or any wholly owned subsidiary anywhere in the world. There is only one class of membership, that being a valid amateur radio operators

licence of any level.

The organization is run similarly to the ARRL but on a much smaller scale, with contests, nets, a QSL Bureau and awards for contacts between members in 5 different countries, for contacts with 100 or more fellow members and a beautiful plaque for over 500 contacts. All modes, including repeaters and packet are valid. While there are over 1200 PIN numbers issued, only about 600 are active, making the 500-plus club quite an achievement.

As far as I am aware there are only 4 other NSARC members who belong to the Firebird Club, Ralph, VE3CRK; Vic, VE3IHK; Norman, VE3YPQ and Paul VE3LHZ. Former club member Ray, VE3OUB is still fondly remembered by many who were at the convention. The cost of membership is small, US\$10.00 per year plus an initiation fee of US\$3.00 with the first years membership. The US\$3.00 covers the cost of mailing a membership package, which includes, a directory of all registered members world-wide, a sample of the extremely attractive QSL card in multi-colours and an embroidered club patch (worth US\$4.00) - also in full colour. In addition there are at least 4 newsletters per year which up-date members on new arrivals, changes and all the other good stuff found in newsletters.

The Firebirds hold two meetings per year. The Spring meeting is held annually at the Dayton Hamfest and the Fall meeting is held randomly at locations throughout North America. The last three conventions were held at Lexington, KY, St. Louis, MO and Columbus, OH. The last meeting in Canada was 1985 in St. Catherines, ON. The convention itself is a get-together of people who at first appeared to be a close knit group of mostly "mature" operators. I introduced myself at the hospitality room and then edged myself to the outside where I would be less conspicuous. That was not to be for long. The attendance register showed one (and only one) "foreigner", and I was not going to get away lightly. To begin with,

I was fresh meat and a rare PIN to add to everyone's potential plaque. I felt akin to a movie star signing autographs, except I was churning out (and receiving) QSL cards after a brief QSO - from the lobby to handhelds and mobiles around the hotel! I found that an ice pack eased my writers cramp and my PTT fingers are beginning to straighten out now.

One of the highlights of the trip was a tour of the Corvette Assembly Plant in Bowling Green - the only place on the planet that the famous car is assembled. As we were special visitors, we each had a very speedy trip around the ring road in one of a fleet of brand new Corvettes set aside especially for our pleasure. On Saturday afternoon at 1.00 PM prompt, we attended the business meeting that covered all the usual topics of a general meeting, financial reports, election of officers, awards etc.. I was flattered to be nominated and seconded for the position of Treasurer, which for travel reasons alone I had to decline. It's just one more gesture that drew me closer to the clan.

Saturday night was banquet night, which brought the three day get-together to a climax. After the speeches we ate our more than ample dinner and then to my surprise I was asked to stand and state my name and home QTH. I felt so at home with these wonderful people that I found the ability to comply and looking around the hall, eye to eye with everyone, I felt that not only did I belong but that I knew that this was the beginning of a new and hopefully long adventure. Early Days of Wireless - Part 3

This bulletin comprises items from "Modern Electrics" - November, 1913.

INSTITUTE OF RADIO ENGINEERS INCORPORATED

The Institute of Radio Engineers, Inc., filed organization papers in Albany on August 23, under the membership corporation law. The object of the society is to advance the art and science of radio transmission and to publish works of literature, science and art for such purposes. The incorporators are Mssrs. R. H. Marriott, Lloyd Espenschied, A. N. Goldsmith, J. Stone, E. J. Simon, R. A. Weagant, G. W. Pickard, J. H. Hammond, Jr., and J. L. Hogan, Jr. The Institute was formed about a year ago by the consolidation of the "Wireless Institute" of New York and the "Society of Wireless Telegraph Engineers", formerly of Boston. When the National Electric Signalling Co. moved its headquarters to New York, a large number of the members of the Society of Wireless Telegraph Engineers were transferred to New York and the union of the two organizations under the new name was the logical result.

A Strange Sort of Electrification

Exec Meeting Minutes

The following is an overview of what transpired at the executive meeting.

The repeater committee is still investigating ways of enhancing the coverage of the 147.120 MHz VE3OSH repeater. One possible option is the use of a voter system. This would consist of several receivers located around the Oshawa area. These receivers would be located at higher elevations around the city thus allowing handie-talkies to activate them who might otherwise not access the repeater. These receivers would be linked to the repeater. The "voter" would determine which receiver from around the city has the strongest signal. The receiver having the strongest signal would be the receiver that would then link to the repeater. The repeater committee is currently looking for one site around city to determine the feasibility and success of such a system. If anyone has access to such a site having power, height and easy access please contact members of the repeater committee or members of the executive.

At the suggestion on Earl, it was decided that members of the executive all obtain a copy of a database program called Alpha IV. All executive members would be able to access membership information and modify the database to include additional data to the database as required. Earl suggested this particular piece of software because of its simplicity, ease of use and its flexibility.

No new business arose as there was little budget remaining in the accounts. It was pointed out that once membership renewals take place at the end of the year and we have completed a successful fleamarket then the club can focus on items that the membership feel should be addressed. It was stressed that the membership fees do not cover the cost of operating the club and that without the money that the fleamarket generates the club would cease to exist.
