
For the longest time I would gently suggest to Joe VE3VGJ that he needed to get into HF. Well, recently he took the bait - hook, line and sinker. Now the problem is he is getting me interested in various aspects of the hobby that compliments HF. Joe has been building his own antennas, as I have experimented too. He made his own ladder line that I



can't wait to see pictures of squirrels running up and down. But most recently he purchased a NanoVNA analyzer. Now, this is only a \$70 CDN device on Amazon so I was not expecting it to be really accurate but close enough to use. **Daren VE3NMD** very generous and lent Joe his Rig Expert and Joe ran some comparisons. It was crazy how close they were. ie an SWR of say 1.45 on the Rig Expert would come up as 1.44 or 1.46 on the Nano which is well within any margin of error. Now, the Rig Expert does cover more frequency range than the Nano does but if all you need is HF, VHF and UHF then this is a serious contender for us frugal Amateurs. As well, if I can figure out how you use it then I am sure you will be able to as wall. Rest assured, you do not need to be a Joe or Daren to use the basic functionality of the device.
