Parks On The Air – VE-1390

Purple Woods Conservation Area is now a recognized POTA (Parks On The Air) site and has the identifier of VE-1390. Originally, this park was not on the list of parks eligible for POTA but I contacted the administrators of the program and they put it on the list. On October 10, I made his first attempt to get an official activation, with the help of Cam VE3IGX,



Joe VE3VGJ and Grant VA3KJI. Sadly, it fell short by a few contacts as band conditions were terrible. However, on October 17, with the help of Joe VE3VGJ and Doug VA3DCE, I was able to get my first official activation in the log from VE-1390. For the activation I used a Xiegu G90 20watt HF transceiver, a Wolf River Coils Silver Bullet 1000 TIA antenna, and a very nice Dakota 23Ah LiFePO4 battery from Cam VE3IGX. There are several others who are looking at setting up portable stations so hopefully there will be a few more North Shore activators on POTA soon! 

Ride 4 United Way

What a ride! The 2020 Ride 4 United Way. September 27th 2020.

Most of you will be aware the NSARC has a strong history of public service. This is something that we are keen to preserve for the following reasons:

- for the contribution to our community
- as a way of demonstrating to the regulators that we are meeting the 'conditions' of our license
- as a way of supporting our national association in their reporting-advice to the government / international bodies
- practicing and polishing our skills in support of safety, urgent, emergency communications when called on

2020 has been a different year and the situation we find ourselves in called for a much different response when United Way called on us for support. Government directions in response to COVID, meant we weren't sure that the event would even be allowed to take place until the Thursday prior to the event. Even on the Friday before the event we were still getting changes to the type and level of support we would provide. With all of this, NSARC fielded a team to support the Ride 4 United Way.

We set up Net Control at St. Bridget's School in Brooklin. We deployed one operator in a 'food truck / rescue vehicle', and 2 operators to what were called 'critical corners'. At Net Control we had 2 operators and an operator serving as a rover. Social distancing and masks were in use for the event. I will offer no jokes about being 2M apart.

This was an excellent opportunity for training and the pace was much more relaxed than in years past. In total 34 message were passed, including identification and announcements. One rider had to be retrieved from the course and returned to St. Bridget's due to a non-serious health / medical issue. Another rider was retrieved from the course with a serious mechanical issue which could not be repaired. Those of you who know the Ride 4 United Way and the level of expertise of the volunteers from the cycling clubs and businesses will know if they can't fix it at the side of the road, it's pretty bad.

Our 'critical corner' operators were instrumental in keep riders on course. The combination of rider speeds and corners in quick succession kept everyone on their toes.

Special thanks to Laird VE3LKS, Cam VE3IGX, Martha VA3SBD, Steve VA3TPS and Thomas VE3PDK for their support making this event work. I will also mention Gerard VE3CWR who was near his rig when we were checking access to the repeater from St. Bridget's the Saturday before the event. Thanks Gerard.

Our repeater performed flawlessly, thanks to the ongoing work of the repeater committee. Thank you all. The feedback we received from United Way was most complementary. Well done everyone! I'm sure we're all looking forward to a more normal year in 2021 and a more normal Ride 4 United Way.

JP's Recipes

Not only is **Jeanette** our amazing coordinator for the R4UW, keeping the likes of **Ken VE3RMK** up to date on all their latest needs, but she is also an amazing baker. Here is a recipe for her **Impossible Coconut Pie** that is so



easy that even your president can make it. Heck, you do not even need to make a crust. Just throw everything in a blender, whip it up, pour it in a pie plate and bake it. Magically a crust will form. Really!

- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 cup coconut unsweetened, desiccated
- 2 cups milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tsp vanilla

Put all into blender, except coconut, and blend. Mix in coconut and pour into a 10 inch greased pie tin. Bake at 350F for about 1 hour until center tests firm. Top will be a nice golden brown.

Wolf River Coils Silver Bullet 1000 TIA



An antenna that has caught the attention of many Amateurs recently is the Wolf River Coils Silver Bullet 1000 TIA (Take It Along). Quick to set up, pretty easy to manually tune, and good results are making it popular for portable activations everywhere. The antenna consists of a coil that has three legs screwed into the bottom to form the stand. The coax also connects on the bottom. Currently, I have three 33' ground planes but you could easily add more. A collapsible 102" whip attaches to the top of the coil. That's it. In literally less than five minutes you can be ready to transmit. You should set it up and play with the adjusting sleeve on the coil to figure out where your best SWR is on the various bands and then

mark those points so you can return to them easily in the future. The antenna is rated for 100w SSB and 25w CW and Digital. With winter approaching, I have ordered a tri-magnet for the roof of my vehicle so instead of attaching the coil to the stand legs I can just attach it directly to the mag mount when I get to where I want to transmit. Don't worry, I will not be leaving it mounted like that to travel. Operators are reporting that you do not need the radials if you have it mounted on your vehicle.


QRM from the Shack
