
February 2021

JP's Recipes

Most of you know Jeanette our amazing co-ordinator for the R4UW. Fewer of you may know that her footwear is like a weather station for those of us who frequent White Feather on the weekends. However, she is an amazing baker and below is another great recipe that she is sharing with us. Zucchini Chocolate Cake sounds delish and I can't wait to smell the aroma of veggies and beans baking in the oven.

Zucchini Chocolate Cake

1 ¾ cups white sugar

- ½ cup soft margarine
- ½ cup oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

% cup sour milk or sour cream (to make milk sour, put 1 tbsp. vinegar into % cup milk)

- 2 cups shredded zucchini
- 2 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- 4 tbsp cocoa
- 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- ½ tsp salt

Cream margarine, add sugar and oil. Add eggs, vanilla and sour milk. Sift dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture. Stir in zucchini. Spoon into 9×13 greased pan. Sprinkle with topping of ½ cup chocolate chips. Bake at 325F for 50 minutes.
