RAC Membership -- What can you get for CAD 0.001920 per day these days?

Well you can get a membership in our national Amateur Radio Organization, the Radio Amateurs of Canada.

If you join before July 1^{st} , the date when the membership fee increases by 4% for the first time since 2010, its CAD 0.001734 per day.

These numbers are for the paper copy of the magazine The Canadian Amateur. The digital subscription membership costs less if you ignore the cost of electricity or batteries.

The membership benefits listed on the RAC website are shown below:

I won't suggest that all of them will be attractive to all HAMs, unless they are driving to get every last bit of value from a penny, are Scottish, or are from Yorkshire, or as my Buba used to tell me, 'are a good Ukranian'. - I like reading the magazine. I work on computers all bloody day. Not looking at a screen and reading is really, REALLY nice.
- I learn things about other parts of the country. As band conditions improve and more importantly as I am able to improve my antennas I hope to be able to talk to more of 'my fellow Canadians".
- I learn things about various aspects of technology, even things I have no direct interest in. Learning is always fun (except perhaps when it comes to how much car repairs cost).

- 5. Supporting the organization that is looking out for the larger interests of my hobby is important to me. After all they're dealing with the Civil Servants and Government Ministers to keep our spectrum, rules and regulations in place. They also band together with other national Amateur Radio organizations to fight for our share of the spectrum internationally.
- Showing support for my fellow HAMs with my membership helps us all.
 Full disclosure here, in general terms it helps us all, all of the time, but it may not necessarily help me directly all the time.
- 7. I believe that sometimes it more than 'being all about me'.
- My Club benefits from my spending \$0.001920 a day with a reduced insurance cost for our liability insurance. This means my annual dues go farther. Each Club member who is also a RAC member saves the Club \$13.00 in insurance fees.
- 9. The QSL Bureau works really well. I actually do use it.
- The Affiliated Club Liability Insurance Program does offer me the comfort of both individual and Club protection from those more litigious members of our society.

For those who may not know, this is what our RAC insurance gets for us:

"Commercial General Liability insurance providing coverage of \$5,000,000 per occurrence with a \$1,000 deductible for normal radio club activities such as club meetings, Field Day, club repeater installations, public events and demonstrations."

"Members of RAC, who are also a member of an insured Affiliated Club – i.e., a club that is participating in the RAC Affiliated Club Insurance Program – will automatically, and at no additional cost, obtain liability coverage for their personal Amateur Radio activities. This provides the same levels of protection (\$5 million limit per occurrence) as the Affiliated Club insurance for their personal station and activities, mobile and portable operation subject to a few conditions. Personal insurance does not cover damage to the member's home or that of a person also insured under the program."

I will point out that Club Liability insurance is one of the things that helped us secure the Purple Woods Site for our repeater. They are a rider on our policy as part of the terms of the agreement between NSARC and CLOCA.

The bottom Line:

We don't have pennies anymore. Personally, I thinks it's a shame because it seems businesses always round up, never down (for me at least). Thousandths of a penny or millipennies doesn't compare with the cost of a coffee at WFF or Timmies. For what is available to members I believe it's worth it. For the benefit of the wider hobby, if nothing else it is noble.

And for those who disagree, let's agree to disagree agreeably.


