The next Youth on the Air Camp for the Americas has been scheduled for July 16-21, 2023 at Carleton University in Ottawa. This is an excellent opportunity for Amateur Radio clubs to help build the leadership of tomorrow.

A team of RAC volunteers will serve as the local host for this event. The main organizers are Roger Egan, VA3EGY, and Harrie Jones, VE3HYS, at yota2023@rac.ca.

Youth On The Air (YOTA) is a program for and by young Amateur Radio operators in the Americas, closely modelled after the Youngsters On The Air program in Region 1 (Europe, Africa and Middle East) of the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU). The goal of the program is to build skills and foster lasting friendships and mentors with younger Amateurs.

Youth On The Air Camp is for Amateur Radio operators between the ages of 15 to 25. A total of 30 campers will be accepted.

Come to YOTA camp and we'll teach you all kinds of cutting-edge technology that can be used with Amateur Radio and connect you to other young Amateurs and mentors in North, Central and South America.

Already an expert? We're looking for young Amateurs to take their knowledge to the next level and share their previous knowledge with other young Amateurs. The camp will focus on building strong relationships with peers and mentors, and developing new radio skills.

Campers will operate a special event station, featuring cutting-edge HF and VHF/UHF radios that many only dream of having a chance to use – and a wide array of antennas.

- Applications begin December 1, 2022.

- 2023 and first-time attendees will be given priority.
- We will accept applications through May 31, 2023.

- Applicants must be certified Amateur Radio operators residing in North,
 Central or South America between the ages of 15 and 25. We welcome
 all Amateurs in our region who meet these requirements.
- Cost: The application process is free and the cost of the camp is \$100
 USD plus transportation to and from the Carleton University. The \$100
 USD fee will not be payable until after acceptance. Should a potential camper not be able to afford the fee, they may apply for a scholarship.

Sponsorship: This is an excellent opportunity for Amateur Radio clubs to help build the leadership of tomorrow.

Changes to the RAC Email Alias/Forwarding System

As previously reported, in January many RAC members whose email addresses used the format "callsign@rac.ca" experienced problems sending and receiving emails.

Thankfully, our IT volunteers were able to resolve the issue, but we had to make significant changes to the system to be compatible with internet, web hosting and cloud service providers in order to prevent future outages.

The result is that we need to be able to separate the email addresses of RAC officials, staff and volunteers from those of our members. In order to achieve this:

- RAC members will switch to "callsign@myrac.ca"
- RAC officials and volunteers ("corporate users") will continue to use "callsign@rac.ca"

Both the "callsign@rac.ca" and the "callsign@myrac.ca" email addresses will work simultaneously until **Sunday, May 15** to give RAC members time to update their user information on any websites and subscriptions

We understand that this is a big change and it is definitely not one we take lightly, but it is a necessary step to ensure that we continue the important work in support of Amateur Radio in Canada and internationally. We appreciate your understanding and continued support.

On Saturday, Lieutenant(N) Jacqueline Wells VE3JQN, Commanding Officer RCSCC Sir Francis Drake the Sea Cadets invited the entire club to come in for an open house, provided us with coffee and donuts, and gave us a tour of the facility including the radio room with the equipment up and running. It was great seeing a couple of the young Sea Cadets, Master Cadet Adam Nissim-Stem VA3BHT and Petty Officer Cadets Abigail Chiu SWL (but working on getting her license) working the station like seasoned Amateurs.

While we were in the radio room John VE3KZT presented the young cadets with an Astatic D-104 microphone to go with the radio. Soon the stock mic will be put into storage and a beautiful D-104 will take its place.

The Sea Cadets do not receive a lot of funding so quite often the leaders dip into their own pockets to pay for special events. You may recall a few months ago they could not get adequate funding to pay for transportation to take several of the Sea Cadet units, with Cadets who have radio and technology interests, to the Science Centre. Several of the White Feather Farm regulars, although we were at Coffee Time that particular morning, donated to help defray the costs. Well, since the local Sea Cadets were so kind as to invite us in and feed us I threw out a challenge to the club - I would match the first \$50 that was donated by the members. 
