Fun With POTA

Well, Monday, October 23 was an absolutely beautiful day with moderate fall temps, blue skies and lovely colours in the trees. It was also a great day to do a



POTA (Parks On The Air) activation and that is exactly what <u>Grant Butcher</u> VA3KJI and I did this particular morning.


Grant and I had been brainstorming about doing a POTA activation for quite some time but our calendars just never seemed to jive.

After many emails we finally settled on a time and date and started prepping our kits. Since this was, what we thought, Grant's first activation we decided on a venue that was familiar to both of us and that we knew how to get to easily. Well,

one of us got there easily and we will just say the other took a more scenic route. Of course, since we were so close to White Feather we decided to meet there first to grab some necessities before heading up the hill. They actually had fresh baked fritters on that Monday morning.



Shortly thereafter we made the jaunt up the hill and arrived at Purple Woods VE-1390 and proceeded to set everything up. All the equipment we used was Grant's but I had some backup equipment just in case. We used a Wolf River Coil antenna and we set it up on what everyone now calls a Magic Carpet. This is just a piece of aluminum door screen but it works great as a ground plane and easier to set up then a bunch of radials. We did need to improvise on how to keep the ends from rolling up but found some bottles of condiments in the repeater shack, left over from the Sermon on the Mount corn roast and BBQ, and they worked great as weights. Tuning the antenna was really easy. Grant pulled out one of those amazingly fancy, and tremendously expensive, analyzers and within minutes we



had it all tuned up and ready to go. Having two sets of hands available to tune an antenna sure makes quick work. With the coax connected to the radio and an SWR of 1.3 to 1 it was time to find a frequency and start calling CQ POTA. Grant started lighting up the airwaves with his pleading calls and I went to the POTA site and posted a spot. Within seconds of the spot Grant was working a pileup and did so for the next hour and a bit. We operated as an activation with two operators so we kept passing the mic back and forth and hopefully entertained those who were listening to us carry on and making contacts with us.

After about an hour and a half the bands faded off to nothing and what signals we could hear did not last long enough to make a log entry so



we decided to pull the plug and shut down. In all we made 59 contacts, which was quite good for a two operator setup, but the fun we had playing radio was priceless.

If you have never tried doing a POTA I would suggest giving it a go. Before you go out on your first activation familiarize yourself with how POTA works and do a lot of hunting for those out there activating. Listen to how activations are run and try to emulate the ones that are running a smooth operation.

Oh, I had mentioned earlier that we thought that this was going to be Grant's first activation. However, we discovered that he actually had one earlier in the year. Now, you may ask how could he have done an activation and not known about it? Well, when we did the Aquino Tank Weekend we were also operating as a POTA activation at VE-5535 Airmen's Park and we submitted all our logs to POTA. This year at Aquino we were not only logging each contact as VE3NSR but were also indicating the operators personal call when they were operating. This is within the POTA guidelines when doing a special event and so not only did each hunter get credit for VE3NSR but



they also got credit for each operator that they worked. The same went for us activators. If you were behind the microphone at Aquino you got the credit for that contact. So, thanks to Grant's participation as an operator during Aquino he made enough contacts that it qualified him for an activation. If you operated at Aquino this year you need to stop by the POTA website and check to see if you got credit for an activation. You only needed 10 contacts during a particular day.

Tnx, Grant, for the great time this morning and hoping to do a few more in the future!

What does it mean?

Recently one of our newer Hams was asking what some of the terms in Amateur Radio mean. So, we will run a short column with some Ham Radio terms and their meaning, for some of the old timers this is old hat but hopefully will help younger and newer Hams.

FT8 : FT8 is a popular form of digital weak signal communication used primarily by amateur radio operators to communicate on amateur radio bands with a majority of traffic occurring on the HF amateur bands. The mode offers operators the ability to communicate in unfavorable environments such as during low sun spot numbers, high RF noise, or during low power operations. With advances in signal processing technology FT8 is able to decode signals with a signal to noise ratio as low as –20 dB in a 2500 Hz bandwidth, which is significantly lower than CW or SSB transmissions.

Antenna analyzer : Device that measures antenna and feedline characteristics, such as impedance, SWR, and bandwidth

APRS: Automatic Packet Reporting System : digital communication protocol (packet radio) for exchanging information among a large number of ham radio stations covering a relatively large area

Cold Solder Joint: Poorly soldered union of two or more electrical conductors, often resulting in an unsound connection or intermittent contact, and can have a grainy appearance

Colpitts oscillator: Oscillator circuit that achieves its waveform generation by positive feedback supplied through a capacitive divider, and is one of (at least) three oscillator circuits used in amateur radio equipment, commonly in VFO applications

Lobe: Spatial signal pattern represented graphically by a balloon or raindrop shape, which shows the relative electromagnetic field directions and signal strengths logarithmically proportional to the distance from the source, typically an antenna.
